## Aeromonas Skin Infections Associated with Tough Mudder Race

### Key Messages

- The County of Sonoma Department of Health Services has issued an alert to clinicians regarding an influx of reports of *Aeromonas* skin infections among patients who participated in Tough Mudder races that were held at the Sonoma Raceway this past weekend –August 19<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
- Most patients presented with a pustular rash, and some with fever, myalgia, nausea/vomiting, and headache with onset approximately 24 hours following the respective events.
- People travel from large distances to attend these events.
- Any potential cases should be reported to the Ventura County Department of Public Health (VCPH) at (805) 981-5201.

### **Situation**

State and county officials are warning physicians and other healthcare providers to be on the lookout for any patients presenting with a pustular rash following participation in a Tough Mudder race that took place this past weekend at the Sonoma Raceway. The County of Sonoma Department of Health Services has identified an outbreak of *Aeromonas* skin infections among individuals who participated in these events between August 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, 2023. More than 80 individuals have been reported to have been affected so far. Reports of cases have come in from numerous counties throughout the state. The rash syndrome appears to be associated in some cases with fever, myalgia, headache, and nausea/vomiting. Several patients have received alternative diagnoses such as folliculitis or staphylococcal infections. Physicians are encouraged to assess the patient's exposure history and procure cultures and antimicrobial sensitivity testing of the pustules. Isolates have been demonstrated to be sensitive to trimethoprim/sulfamethoxazole, doxycycline, and ciprofloxacin.
