## **Boil Water Orders and Surgical Procedures**

A number of areas within Ventura County are under **boil water orders** at this time. The reason these orders have been put in place is not because of water contamination with smoke and ash but because of power outages that have led to backflow problems and consequent concerns about drinking **water contamination**. This contamination could consist of any number of organisms but the presence of enteric organisms cannot be ruled out at this time.

Surgeons who are scrubbing in to a procedure, whether in the hospital or in a private office, are scrubbing up with this potentially contaminated water. Surgical scrubbing solutions (soap) has been tested against contaminated hands, but little attention has been paid to their efficacy in sterilizing contaminated water. The bacteria in contaminated water will be different than that found on hands.

Therefore, if you are scrubbing up to perform a sterile procedure and you are located in an area that is under a boiled water order, you should be using **sterile water**. Liter volumes of sterile water are <u>not</u> available at groceries or most commercial pharmacies. For what will probably be a short duration of a boiling water order in your area, use liter bags of sterile water from your hospital pharmacy. Bottles of distilled water have been shown to be contaminated with Legionella, Pseudomonas aeruginosa, Burkholderia and other gram – negative organisms and so may not be substituted for sterile water. To avoid using tap water of questionable sterility, have a nurse or other aid stand by the doctor and pour sterile water on his or her hands, following which the doctor will scrub up, and then this should be followed by pouring additional sterile water over the doctor's hands to rinse them off. It is also important to remind hospitals that if they are under a boiled water order, they are **required to notify their regional office of Licensing and Certification immediately**.
